PRAIRIES RESEARCH & EDUCATION IN TEXAS: NPAT recently submitted a letter to our State Legislators emphasizing the importance of our Coastal Prairies, and in support of Texas HB 2285: "designates the University of Houston Coastal Center as the "Texas Institute for Coastal Prairie Research and Education". The bill was passed by both houses and signed by Governor Abbot on June 15, 2017, and is effective immediately.

#### **HOW DOES A PERSON TO "RESTORE" A PRAIRIE??**

**RESTORING Kirchoff Family Farm:** You will get a pretty realistic 'picture' of what can be involved in the very rewarding task of restoring a prairie, on NPAT's website. The Kirchoff Family provides regular updates (written and photo accounts) on the restoration of their 200-acre prairie which they began in 2011. They have learned valuable lessons, including the fact that managing the restoration of a prairie involves many responsibilities: controlling invasive species to enable native prairie plants to thrive, implementing prescribed grazing, producing hay and conducting controlled burns. The work is strenuous but very fulfilling. **Take a look at the diversity.** see fields where hay is harvested and the odd, "wetland areas" too!
